And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake,
that we may now live a godly, righteous, and sober life,
to the glory of your holy Name. Amen.

Priest: The Almighty and merciful Lord grant you absolution and remission of all your sins, true repentance, amendment of life, and the grace and consolation of his Holy Spirit. Amen.

JOURNALING & DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Key Insight: Enduring hardship is part of our lives as Christ followers. Christ and the apostles endured suffering and so will we. This is not to say that we should seek out suffering as even Christ asked that the cup be passed if possible. During Christ's suffering he remained relational with his disciples who were sleeping, acted like himself in obedience to and communion with the Father, and returned to Joy in enduring the cross. Our ability to endure hardship is something we grow in as Christians and leaders. The Rare Leadership book offers several stages of growth to describe how we endure hardship as we mature:

- Infant Not able to care for self or communicate needs. Makes it clear that they are upset but not why.
- Child Able to care for self in growing measure and communicate needs. Not yet skilled at remaining relational or solving problems with the group's needs in focus. Learning who their people are and what it means to act like themselves.
- Adult Able to care for self and one other person at the same time.
 Able to remain relational, act like themself and return to joy in the face of challenges. Avoids falling into addictive behavior to endure hardship.
- Parent Able to model and teach skills needed to remain relational, act like themself and return to joy. Further the adult can see when their own skills or teaching ability is limited and provide other resources so as not to stunt the growth of the spiritual children.
- Elder Having raised children of their own they are able to take on the needs of the community. Elders can see who in the flock needs parenting/re-parenting and gather these people under their wing and make them part of their people.

QUESTIONS:

- How did you identify with Paul's testimony?
- How has your experience been different?
- Take time to reflect on your patterns of behavior when facing hardship. Are there any specific areas where you feel you need to grow?
- Review the stages of maturity. Where do you see examples of these levels of leadership around you? How do you see yourself growing in maturity? Are there new ways that you and those you lead need to grow?
